My favorites toys are chews to help me get through teething, tug toys and for sure my teddy bear and moose stuffies.



Harriet Doerr, Stones for Ibarra

Tété-Michel Kpomassie, An African in Greenland

"Tété-Michel Kpomassie was a teenager in Togo when he discovered a book about Greenland—and knew that he must go there. Working his way north over nearly a decade, Kpomassie finally arrived in the country of his dreams. This brilliantly observed and superbly entertaining record of his adventures among the Inuit is a testament both to the wonderful strangeness of the human species and to the surprising sympathies that bind us all."

Tony Cohan, On Mexican Time: A New Life in San Miguel

"An American writer and his wife find a new home—and a new lease on life—in the charming sixteenth-century hill town of San Miguel de Allende. Awakened to needs they didn't know they had, they returned to California, sold their house, and cast off for a new life. Necessary work, but it's not exactly scratching the itch he feels to be in the heart of the action."

KL Going, King of the Screwups

"When Liam is finally kicked out of the house, his father's brother takes him in. What could a teenage chick magnet possibly have in common with his gay, glam rocker, DJ uncle who lives in a trailer in upstate New York? A lot more than you'd think. And when Liam attempts to make himself over as a nerd in a desperate attempt to impress his father, it's his 'aunt' Pete and the guys in his band who convince Liam there's much more to him than his father will ever see."

Noah Hawley, Before the Fall

"On a foggy summer night, eleven people--ten privileged, one down-on-his-luck painter--depart Martha's Vineyard on a private jet headed for New York. Sixteen minutes later, the unthinkable happens: the plane plunges into the ocean. COMMUNITY NEWS

Here is a summary of the minutes of the November 7 HOA meeting:



November 7th 2020

The first HOA General meeting since January was held outside the clubhouse at 11 am with approximately 30 residents attending.

Topics included:

- Christmas decorations, now installed across the park till January.
- The dark sky proposal to mitigate light pollution. Light fixtures are being modified and new light bulbs are included. Management is also looking at alternate types of fixtures.
- The housing inspection was completed, about 20 residents had received a notification.
 Information about materials and repairs to sheds is available at the park office. Information is also on the website.
- An emergency "to go" bag was discussed, Please use rechargeable lithium-ion batteries as these
 do not corrode. Contact Gary Witten for further information or it can be obtained on the website
 under the Emergency Disaster Preparedness tab.
- Please contact the office if you have concerns about park security or to report any incident.
 First Alarm patrols the park in the evening, and management is working to ensure the safety of the community. If you have something to report, note the time, date and area so security footage can be viewed more efficiently.
- Mis-addressed mail will be returned to the post office, marked as undelivered. The park management will not receive or redirect mail on behalf of residents due to legal issues.
- Regarding things that need to be done around the park, ELS management requests that residents
 do not ask Enrique, the park maintenance engineer directly, but instead put in a request to the
 office. This will create a time line needed to show how his time is being utilized.

Thank you to all who endured the cold weather and joined us. The next HOA meeting in January will be held at a later date to be determined in compliance with prevailing COVID regulations/restrictions.

Information will be sent via email blast, flyers on notice boards, website and call blast.

Also, the resident list will be ready in January and I will be emailing a copy to anyone who is interested. Some of the residents have already requested a copy so I will try and remember those who did. Feel free to remind me the beginning of January please.
















Thanksgiving Feast for the Eyes!
