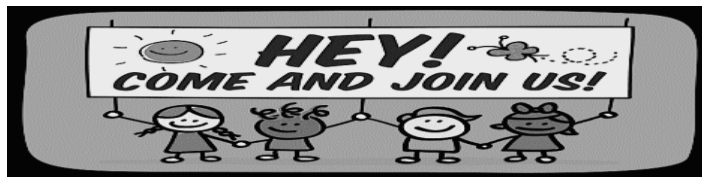

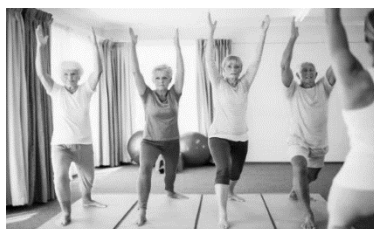

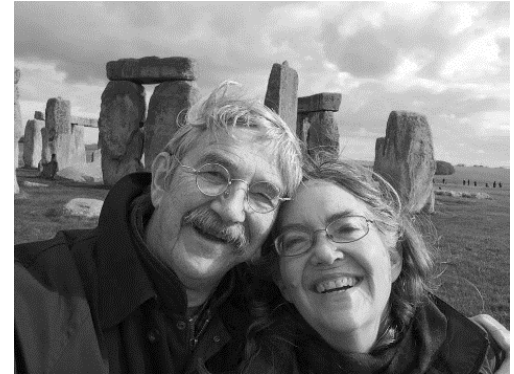

Welcome to our new librarians! SPACE #78

Christie Cochrell grew up in Santa Fe, New Mexico, where life included climbing to Anasazi caves and cliff-top ruins on long cottonwood ladders, watching deer and antelope dances at nearby pueblos on Christmas Day, ushering at the summer opera, and getting rid of the year's cares during the annual burning of Zozobra, Old Man Gloom (a huge paper effigy), at the beginning of Fiesta. With her parents, and later a favorite aunt, she spent a lot of time over the years at Keauhou Bay, on the Kona Coast of the Big Island of Hawaii, where they made friends with local islanders and learned Hawaiian history and customs. The ashes of both her parents are scattered in the bay just outside the Place of Refuge, Pu'uho-nua O Honaunau, sacred to the ancient Hawaiians.



Christie got her BA and MA at Mills College in Oakland, studying mostly literature and philosophy. She spent much of her senior year in the letterpress studio, learning to "mind her Ps and Qs." She then took jobs in the claims department of a cargo shipping company in San Francisco, at an antiquarian bookstore off Union Square, and in the sombrero-like building at Redwood Shores, much like the De Anza gazebo, where the developers of Redwood Shores were based the year before Marine World moved away. In 1982 she started work at Stanford University, where she spent almost 35 years, first with a Slavic Studies association and then at the University Press.

As Exhibits Manager for the Press, she traveled extensively to cities around the US—New York, Boston, Chicago, Washington, DC, and New Orleans, always tacking on extra days for exploring. The accumulated Frequent Flier miles came in handy for traveling in her free time to favorite places across the world—Italy, Greece, Mallorca, England, France. At Stanford Christie took many Continuing Studies classes, including two summer archaeological digs—one on the St. Bernard Pass, in the Alps between Italy and Switzerland, staying at the Augustinian monastery (and of course visiting the dog kennels!), and the other at Binchester, England, near Hadrian's Wall, staying in the Norman castle in Durham next to the Cathedral.

She's been a creative writer all her life. Named New Mexico Young Poet of the Year while still in Santa Fe, she's had dozens of pieces published (poetry, short stories, and creative nonfiction), and won several awards. Now that she's retired, she's delighted to be able to spend most of her time writing—and gazing out at the lagoon for inspiration. She's recently given two readings from stories published by the wonderful local literary journal, *Catamaran*. John Feneron grew up in London, England, with frequent visits to his grandparents in Merthyr Tydfil, Wales. He has memories of roaming Hampstead Heath freely, as if it were his own back yard, and bicycling all over



London—safe and easy in those days. The young John and his mother were also allowed to sit and rest their feet on the "sacrifice" stone at Stonehenge during a visit there, without being chased off. He's sad at how much London has changed, with many of the great old bookshops in the West End alleyways long closed, and was appalled last year to find a big theme park next to the boat basin in Stratford-upon-Avon, across the river from the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, but finds northern England still much like the old country he knew—

especially York, with its friendly residents, splendid Cathedral, rambling streets, and Yorkshire curd tarts. And at Kenwood House on Hampstead Heath, with a view of the distant London skyline, and magpies and dogwalkers on the expansive green lawns, it's almost as if the old London he remembers has returned for an hour or two. The theatre is still wonderful, anyway; and his daughter, Wendy, makes sure he doesn't miss any popular new musicals!

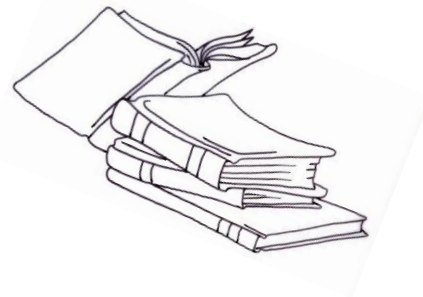
John came to California to study Classics in 1971, then taught in Alberta for three years before returning to California, where he spent nearly four decades at Stanford University Press, editing academic books. In retirement he spends much of his time binge-reading, especially Shakespeare, and is currently working his way through the New Testament in the conversational Greek original, a very different experience from the magisterial King James translation he grew up with.

John and Christie met at Stanford University Press and got married in the beautiful garden at Sand Rock Farm in Aptos in 2006. Favorite trips together have been to Crete (research for one of Christie's novels, and John's first visit to Knossos and Tholos tombs and all the Minoan treasures in the Heraklion Museum, all heaven for a Classicist), Venice, opera composers' homes in Italy (Verdi's in Busseto, Puccini's in Lucca, and Rossini's apartment in Florence which they stayed in), and many places in England: Stonehenge and Salisbury, Wells and Cheddar Gorge, Kenilworth, Canterbury, Glastonbury, and Glyndebourne—famous for opera, bow ties, sheep, and fancy picnics. They like to go to plays and classical music performances, cathedrals and abbeys, castles, Roman and Etruscan remains, art museums, and tempting cafés, preferably under the trees or in a picturesque courtyard or crypt.

John and Christie have lived at De Anza since May 2017, and most of all love taking their garbage to the dumpster above the ocean! They came here quite by chance, from Los Altos, when they were trying to determine where they could retire, after learning that the immigration laws had become punitive in England. They were amazed to learn about the possibilities in Santa Cruz, and were won immediately by the climate, culture, sea otters, pelicans, and oyster catchers with their bright orange legs and beaks.

They have no pets per se, but welcome to their backyard towhees, white- and golden-crowned sparrows, pygmy nuthatches, doves, and (by sufferance) pesky pigeons and squirrels. They thought it a good sign to find a killdeer nesting in the gravel of their side yard when they first moved in. They enjoy the inherited poppies that have taken over the yard since then, and they'd like to plant a Shakespeare garden out back, using a plant guide from the unexpected Shakespeare Museum they came across in Moss Landing one day. As if they didn't have more than enough books of their own to keep tabs on, they've recently taken on the care and maintenance of the De Anza library.

- **Library Update:** Again, a huge thanks to Christie and John who have volunteered for the librarian position. They have organized the library and would like to share some of the changes.



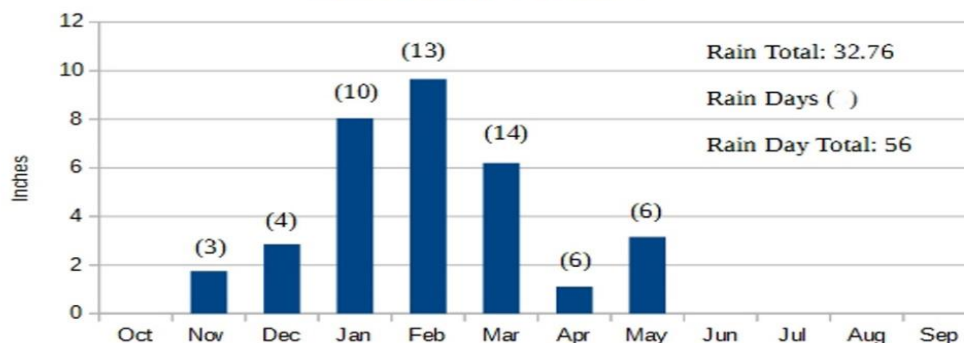

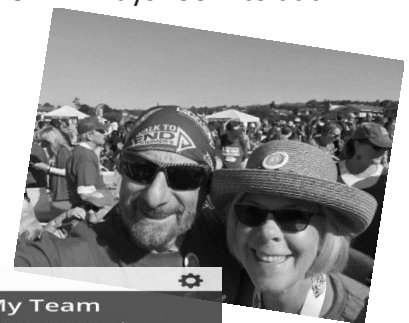

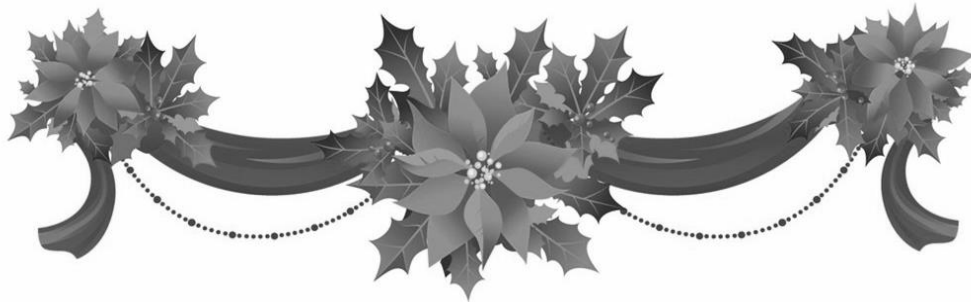

HOA General Meeting
7pm Sept 18th 2019

Summary

The meeting was attended by about thirty residents

HOA board members present:

Merit Herman, Don Payne, Eugene Markowitz, Dave Allenbaugh, Gary Whitten, Jim Cannon, Amalie Sinclair

The minutes of the July 24th HOA General Meeting were approved.

Issues discussed included:

Modification of the De Anza Office hours

The office is open weekday mornings, office staff will be engaging in walk about during the afternoon. Residents expressed some concern about reduction of services, a suggestion was made that messages could be forwarded to cell phone if the manager and staff are onsite, and thereby ensure continuity and responsiveness.

Arroyo renovation and installation of retaining walls

Over the past few years, natural erosion had created the need for certain repairs and modifications. These included repairs to pond, structural works, and environmental renovations. The permitting process has been very drawn out and extensive, but this should be completed by end of October and the expectation is that work will commence before the rainy season sets in. Some questions were raised about time frames and duration of work, and management will continue to provide updates as they go through

Emergency Procedures

Santa Cruz Fire Department has provided a four-page handbook, describing evacuation routes and safety procedures. Copies will be delivered to all residents. Additionally, a "vial of life" to house medical and special needs information which should be placed in the refrigerator. In case of emergency, first responders will look in this location ! We have 200 of these for distribution to the residents.

Park Lighting

Questions were raised about the Santa Cruz dark sky ordinance.

The lighting system is being evaluated and modification may be proposed to reduce glare.

Some additional lighting has been requested for the club house parking lot.

Dumpster Bins

The HOA is working to improve ease of access, as the lids are large and heavy to lift.

A couple of solutions have been tried out, bin props have been used,

but so far a pulley system seems to be the most effective.

Internet and Solar

Investigation continues into the Cruzio installation

Other features may include a solar panel energy platform, together with e-charge facilities for cars.

HOA board suggest that residents' issues can be sent by e-mail prior to the meeting, which would help ensure that information and references can be more carefully located and addressed.

The next HOA General Meeting is scheduled for November 20th
