In response to suggestions by library patrons, we'd like to assemble a shelf or two of women's studies/ feminist books. We invite and welcome all donations of appropriate material for these shelves, including recent (auto) biography and politics/sociology/gender studies, classic titles in the field, fiction by feminist authors, and fiction with strong and/or admirable women protagonists, dealing with issues that affect our being and well-being.

In connection with this, can those who use the library regularly please opine on which old books might be removed to make room for this and any other new initiatives? Does anyone still read the Readers Digest anthologies which appear never to be touched? What about cookbooks, hobbies, spirituality, self-help, large print, travel, etc.? Any other requests that might be addressed in updating and winnowing out the present collection? Mystery/Thriller continues to be the most popular section, followed by Romance. We have considered combining the paperbacks and hardbacks in these categories to make it easier to browse for favorite or not-yet-discovered authors, but that would require a huge repositioning of shelves (moving all those in the paperback section up a notch or two to accommodate the larger formats) besides having to move the books themselves. For the time being, anyway, we'll ask you to continue checking both places to find titles that interest you.

Suggestions/strong feelings about which books should not be gotten rid of can be *emailed to Christie and John at bonnard3@gmail.com*, or written down and placed in the small plastic box that will be located on top of the regular book return/donation bin next to the TV in the library.

Thanks very much for helping keep our collection of books equitable and attractive to all.

Incidentally, the Goodwill drop-off in the Whole Foods parking lot no longer accepts books that are not in good condition. It seems those must now just be discarded—unless anyone knows of other places that will accept them? (Please let us know.) It's really hard to throw away a book, we know (it hurts!), but that, sadly, has to be done. The glue in bindings makes recycling not an option either. And if you're interested in inexpensive books, the Friends of the Capitola Library has reopened their big bookstore in the Capitola Mall, with most books selling for \$1 or \$2 each (cash or check only).

Recommendations by Christie Cochrell

Andrea Barrett, The Voyage of the Narwhal (novel)

"Capturing a crucial moment in the history of exploration—the mid-nineteenth century romance with the Arctic—Andrea Barrett's compelling novel tells the story of a fateful expedition. Through the eyes of the ship's scholar-naturalist, Erasmus Darwin Wells, we encounter the Narwhal's crew, its commander, and the far-north culture of the Esquimaux. In counterpoint, we meet the women left behind in Philadelphia, explorers only in imagination."

Caroline Alexander, Mrs. Chippy's Last Expedition: The Remarkable Journal of Shackleton's Polar-Bound Cat (fiction) "Closely based on the true events of Shackleton's heroic journey, and illustrated with authentic photographs taken by Frank Hurley, expedition photographer, Mrs. Chippy's Last Expedition is a firsthand account of one of the greatest adventures in history—from a unique point of view." "Alexander has done a fine job. . . allowing the cat's (and her own) sense of humor to have full run." (NY Times Book Review)

John Steinbeck, The Log from the Sea of Cortez (travelogue)

"In 1940, Steinbeck and his close friend, biologist Ed Ricketts, embarked on a month long marine specimen-collecting expedition in the Gulf of California, which resulted in their collaboration on the Sea of Cortez. In 1951, after Ricketts's death, Steinbeck reissued his narrative portion of the work in memory of his friend and the inspiration for *Cannery Row*'s 'Doc.' This exciting day-by-day account of their journey together is a rare blend of science, philosophy, and high-spirited adventure."

Christina Thompson, Sea People: The Puzzle of Polynesia (history)

Kenneth Brower, The Starship and the Canoe (biography)



Dave Eggers, Annie Dills, The Lights and Types of Ships at Night (picture book)

Meet a trawler, a steamship, a RoRo, an exploratory vessel and more across richly illustrated pages, alive with the glowy, otherworldly nighttime scenes of boats as seen from a child's perspective."

L.T.C. Rolt, Narrow Boat (history)

"First published in 1944, and now reissued over 60 years on, this fully illustrated book has become a classic on its subject, and may be said to have started a revival of interest in the English waterways. It was on a spring day in 1939 that L.T.C. Rolt first stepped aboard Cressy. This engaging book tells the story of how he and his wife adapted and fitted out the boat as a home, and recreates the journey of some 400 miles that they made along the network of waterways in the Midlands. It recalls the boatmen and their craft, and celebrates the then seemingly timeless nature of the English countryside through which they passed."



Dorothy Herrmann, Robert Jones, Hitchcock's California: Vista Visions From the Camera Eye

"Part tribute, part pictorial essay, and part travelogue, this stunning hardbound book is truly the first art book that does justice to the art of legendary movie director Alfred Hitchcock. More than 100 original photographs, dozens of 'behind the scenes' vintage photos from Hitchcock's movies, and a ranging conversation between noted Hitchcock scholar Dan Auiler and photojournalist Robert Jones. Joel Gunz of Alfred Hitchcock Geek remarks of this volume: 'It's a coffee table book; It's almost a coffee table!""

Penelope Fitzgerald, Offshore (novel)

"This Booker Prize—winning novel of loneliness and connecting is set among the houseboat community of the Thames. On the Battersea Reach, a mixed bag of the slightly disreputable, the temporarily lost, and the patently eccentric live on houseboats, rising and falling with the tides of the Thames. There is good-natured Maurice, by occupation a male prostitute, by chance a receiver of stolen goods. And Richard, an ex-navy man whose boat, much like its owner, dominates the Reach. Then there is Nenna, an abandoned wife and mother of two young girls running wild on the muddy foreshore, whose domestic predicament, as it deepens, will draw this disparate community together."

Colin Dexter, The Wench Is Dead (mystery)

"It is only to entertain himself in the hospital that the impatient Inspector Morse opens the little book called Murder on the Oxford Canal. But so fascinating is the story it tells—of the notorious 1859 murder of Joanna Franks aboard the canal boat Barbara Bray—that not even Morse's attractive nurses can distract him from it. Was Joanna really raped and murdered by fellow passengers? Morse believes the men hanged for the crime were innocent. Now, in one of the most dazzling investigations of his career, Morse sets out to piece together the shattered past, hoping to expose the shocking truth about the Barbara Bray."

Ngaio Marsh, Clutch of Constables (mystery)

"At loose ends, with her detective husband, Roderick Allen, otherwise occupied, artist Troy Alleyn embarks on a pleasure cruise down the Thames. She is accompanied by a colorful cast of characters. Early on in the cruise, Troy notices the charming countryside, a stand of elms, a local pub, and exclaims, 'The place is swarming with Constables... A perfect clutch of them.' She is referring to John Constable, a British landscape painter whose work consisted of scenes such as the ones Troy was viewing from the boat."

Agatha Christie, Death on the Nile (mystery)

"Beloved detective Hercule Poirot embarks on a journey to Egypt in one of Agatha Christie's most famous mysteries. The tranquility of a luxury cruise along the Nile is shattered by the discovery that Linnet Ridgeway has been shot through the head. She was young, stylish, and beautiful. A girl who had everything . . . until she lost her life. With an obvious suspect who cannot possibly have committed the crime, it is up to Hercule Poirot 🛜 to probe the depths of a remarkable criminal mind and discover the dark secret behind what is only the first in a series of inexplicable deaths."

Ruth Ware, The Woman in Cabin 10 (mystery)

"In this tightly wound, enthralling story reminiscent of Agatha Christie's works, Lo Blacklock, a journalist who writes for a travel magazine, has just been given the assignment of a lifetime: a week on a luxury cruise with only a handful of cabins. The sky is clear, the waters calm, and the veneered, select guests jovial as the exclusive cruise ship, the Aurora, begins her voyage in the picturesque North Sea. At first, Lo's stay is nothing but pleasant: the cabins are plush, the dinner parties are sparkling, and the guests are elegant. But as the week wears on, frigid winds whip the deck, gray skies fall, and Lo witnesses what she can only describe as a dark and terrifying nightmare: a woman being thrown overboard. The problem? All passengers remain accounted for—and so, the ship sails on as if nothing has happened, despite Lo's desperate attempts to convey that something (or someone) has gone terribly, terribly wrong..."

Donna Leon, Earthly Remains (mystery)

"Under doctor's orders to take a break from his police work, Commissario Guido Brunetti heads to the island of Sant'Erasmo in the Venice laguna, the often swampy waters surrounding the Venetian archipelago. There he'll resume a hobby from younger days: rowing in the shallow Venetian boats called *puparin*, shorter than the more well-known gondola, in which the oarsman stands. His rowing mentor will be Davide Casati, the caretaker of the villa in which Brunetti stays and friend of Brunetti's late father. The recuperative stay goes according to plan until Casati goes missing following a sudden storm."
